Dear Parents and Students,



Eagle Song Activity Options

Select one of the options below to complete and bring it the first day of school.

- 1) Write a different ending to the story you have read Write a summary of the story. Make the events change so that the new ending could actually happen. Your ending should be completed in a well thought out paragraph or paragraphs.
- 2) **Design a new book jacket for your book** Include the title and author of the book on the front cover. Write a summary of the book on the back cover in paragraph form. Make sure that your book jacket is colorful!
- 3) Find a shoebox and construct a diorama of an important scene from the book You can include anything in your box to make your scene realistic. Write at least one paragraph describing the scene to accompany your diorama.

- 4) Write a sample book review for a school newspaper Your review should tell your opinion of the book, good or bad, and your reasons for feeling the way you do. Support your opinion by using quotations or events from the book. This should be a well put together paragraph or paragraphs.
- 5) Construct a mobile of characters in the story and hang them from a clothes hanger Attached to each character should be a description and something interesting that happened to them.
- 6) Choose an interesting scene from your book and illustrate it You can use any art materials that you have (canvas, paint, watercolors, chalk, etc). It must be done at least on a 12x18 size sheet. It must be very detailed, and show an obvious effort. On a sheet of lined paper, write a description of the scene you drew. This should be a well put together paragraph or paragraphs.
